Our Volunteers: Visible, Vibrant, and Vital



In this annual report, we take special note of the value that volunteers bring to our agency. In 2008, more than 68,000 hours of time were donated--contributing to an array of services and activities benefiting 6,900 seniors and adults with disabilities in Grafton County.



Our volunteers are visible. Whether working at a senior center, serving on an advisory council, or providing direct assistance in the community, volunteers perform a myriad of tasks. They might include: packaging meals for home delivery, driving seniors to and from medical appointments, or providing entertainment at a senior luncheon.



Our volunteers are vibrant. While many of our volunteers are seniors themselves, we have volunteers of all ages. From the students who clear dishes at senior luncheons to the contractor who installs grab bars at an elderly neighbor's home--all of our volunteers make a significant contribution. Not surprisingly, the benefits to the volunteers themselves are many. A study issued in 2007 by the Corporation for National and Community Service reports that "when individuals volunteer, they not only help their community but also experience better health in later years."



Our volunteers are vital. It is a simple truth that Grafton County Senior Citizens Council would not be able to provide the services we do without volunteers. While it is impossible to quantify perfectly the value of volunteerism, there are measures available. Calculated at minimum wage, volunteers' time contributes more than \$400,000 to our agency's bottom line--a significant figure.



In addition to its many programs and services, GCSCC is proud to be the sponsor of RSVP and The Volunteer Center whose mission is to connect people of all ages with meaningful volunteer opportunities. We thank our many wonderful volunteers, encourage you to read the inspiring stories that follow, and, if possible, invite you to give your time to GCSCC, your local senior center, or one of the many deserving agencies in our area.

Volunteer Highlights

“Too many cooks in the kitchen?”

If you ask the staff at Littleton Area Senior Center, they might agree that *sometimes* it's a good thing. Last Spring, Maud Thompson and a group of volunteers created a recipe for success when they determined to raise every penny for a new convection oven. Maud heard about the need for the oven through the senior center grapevine and came up with the idea for a quilt raffle. She convened the 'Silver Stitches' and together they created the classically-patterned 'Summer Porch Quilt.' The work didn't end there, however. Throughout the summer and into the fall, Maud and Ann Sykes sold raffle tickets almost every weekend at a variety of sites including farmer's markets, grocery stores, and craft shows. A local insurance agency agreed to display the quilt in its window and sell tickets as well. They didn't stop until they sold \$3,000 in tickets. By November, the quilt found a home with a lucky winner and a new oven found a home at the senior center. There it is being put to constant use: Littleton Area Senior Center prepares 200 meals per day—half are served at the center and the other half are home-delivered.

As the former Athletic Director at Dartmouth College, Dick Jaeger knows a few things about teams and teamwork. At Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, he has put that knowledge into action. Now in his second term as President of the Board, Dick is the equivalent of team captain, providing vision and leadership for the agency's board and various committees. He is also a hard-working player at the Mascoma Area Senior Center where he serves on the advisory council and delivers meals twice a week to residents in the towns of Orange, Canaan, and Enfield. In addition, he pitches in whenever necessary as a 'Chore Corps' volunteer. Two of his recent assignments included installing an air conditioner in the mobile home of a terminally ill veteran and helping an elderly neighbor clear her home of accumulated materials that posed a potential fire-hazard.

Never underestimate the energy and enthusiasm of sixth grade girls!

The Lebanon Lightning Legos (from Hanover Street Elementary School) lived up to their name when they delivered a flash of brilliance to the Upper Valley Senior Center. Participating as a team in First Lego League (FLL), a global program to get kids excited about science and technology, the girls were challenged to solve a real-world problem related to energy conservation. They chose to focus their efforts locally by doing an energy audit for the senior center. The girls conducted research on-site and presented their findings at a senior center luncheon. Among their recommendations were: sealing windows with plastic during winter months, installing a fan to vent hot air from the kitchen into the dining room, using bio-diesel fuel for the senior center buses, and . . . exercising or dancing to get warm! They then went the extra step and organized a bake sale at school which raised funds to implement some of their cost-saving strategies. They purchased kits to seal windows, fabric and patterns to make thermal shades, and a fan for the kitchen. A local electrician, impressed by the girls' gumption, donated his services to install the fan.



Programs and Services

Home Delivered Meals

Volunteers bring a hot meal, freshly prepared in the senior centers' kitchens, to the door of homebound adults. With the meal, the volunteer also brings a greeting and check of the recipient's well being. Last year, the Council provided 140,760 home delivered meals to nearly all towns in Grafton County.

Congregate Meals

Our eight senior centers provide a welcome setting for participants to visit with friends and enjoy a nutritious lunchtime meal. A newsletter is distributed monthly with the menu. Last year, GCSCC centers served 79,133 congregate meals.

Transportation

Ten lift-equipped buses transport older and disabled adults to medical appointments, shopping, or the local senior center. Coordinators at our senior centers help arrange this transportation and can sometimes accommodate requests for long-distance medical transportation provided by volunteers. Last year, the Council provided 47,450 rides.

Outreach and Social Services

Each senior center employs Outreach Workers whose goal is to connect seniors with the services they need to live independently. They provide outreach to isolated individuals, as well as advocacy, counseling, and information regarding support groups to both elders and their caregivers. *The Grafton County ServiceLink Resource Center*, sponsored by GCSCC, provides additional social services support, specializing in Medicare and Medicaid, as well as caregiver support, information and assistance. Last year, ServiceLink and GCSCC outreach workers provided support for families on 12,737 occasions (an average of one-half hour each).

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. is a private nonprofit organization that was incorporated in 1972. It is supported by government grants and contracts, contributions from local towns and Grafton County, contributions from participants, bequests, private grants, charitable donations and the three United Ways that serve our region.

GCSCC's purpose is to develop, strengthen and provide programs and services that support the health, dignity and independence of older adults and adults with disabilities living in our communities. GCSCC achieves its purpose through programs and services offered at senior centers located throughout Grafton County.

Senior Center Activities and Programs

Ranging from art and exercise classes to blood pressure clinics and computer instruction, each center offers recreational, educational and health-related programs. Many programs are held mid-day so that participants can enjoy a program as well as the congregate meal.

Adult Care Programs

GCSCC offers licensed adult day care at the Upper Valley and Horse Meadow Senior Centers and licensed adult in-home care in southern Grafton County. Adult group day care provides a safe environment and stimulating activities for adults whose mental or physical health does not permit them to be alone safely during the day. Adult in-home care provides companionship and assistance with chores and light housework for frail elders and adults with disabilities. In 2008, GCSCC provided 26,042 hours of adult care.

Volunteer opportunities


A broad range of volunteer opportunities is available through the centers and RSVP and The Volunteer Center. RSVP signature programs include:

Chore Corps: Assisting with chores, repairs and safety modifications in and around clients' homes.

Good Morning!: A reassurance service which provides a daily morning phone call to elderly individuals who are homebound, living alone and at risk for falls, accidents or sudden illness.

Bone Builders: An exercise and nutrition class offered at several senior centers.

AARP Money Management: Connecting trained volunteers with elders and adults with disabilities who need assistance with bill paying.

Letter from the President and Executive Director

Recalling the year past is a helpful annual exercise—especially in a time of economic hardship and uncertainty. For GCSCC, the increasing economic stress began to affect our participants last summer. Suddenly, we saw an upsurge in demand for all of our services and we ended 2008 setting records for meals, rides, elder care, and outreach services. We also served 500 more individuals than in previous years.

How do we meet the needs? Community support.

In 2008, GCSCC relied on 921 individual volunteers! Young students contributed a couple of hours to serve meals; some long-time volunteers contributed more than 1,000 hours providing medical transportation, preparing and delivering meals, serving on their senior center's advisory council, and more. Thank you to these dedicated individuals who outnumbered the agency's paid staff 10-to-1 last year.

From October 1, 2007 through September 30, 2008, GCSCC received six gifts from individuals who named the agency or one of its senior centers in their estate plan. These gifts ranged in size from \$500 to tens of thousands of dollars:

- An anonymous bequest supported Horse Meadow Senior Center services;
- The Roberta T. Bartlett Charitable Remainder Trust helped complete the renovation of the second floor of the Plymouth Regional Senior Center;
- The Harry and Marion Brown Revocable Trust enabled GCSCC keep services in place from 2004 through 2008; the final distribution from the estate of this Lebanon couple took place last year.
- The Charlotte Bursey Estate helped Mascoma Area Senior Center purchase a new bus to replace the old vehicle;
- The Natalie Kenyon Estate supported Upper Valley home delivered meals and transportation;
- The Louise P. Leach Revocable Trust provided support for Mascoma Area Senior Center home delivered meals.

Many of these generous individuals who remembered GCSCC in their estate plans had volunteered for their local senior center. Many of them also had benefited from GCSCC services in their later, and frailer, years.

Our services and programs provide a continuum of care for older adults. We rely on volunteers to help provide daily, vital services. When volunteers age, they may themselves depend upon our volunteer-delivered services. And, in some cases, very generous and special individuals honor the services that enabled them to age in place by remembering their senior center and GCSCC in their estate plan.

Already in 2009, we have received two bequests that will provide direct support for GCSCC services through the Upper Valley and Horse Meadow Senior Centers. Paul Darling, a long-time volunteer, remembered the Horse Meadow Senior Center in his will. Paul was in his late 80s when the new senior center was being built, and he wondered aloud if he would live to experience the grand opening. He was an ardent fund-raiser for the new building, making it his daily work to approach people he had known his entire life to ask for support for the new center in North Haverhill. He traveled all over the North Country, in his old mini-van and in spite of significant health issues and advanced age, visiting friends, neighbors, and local businesses to ensure the success of the project. Paul Darling not only had the chance to enjoy the grand opening in August 2000, he also celebrated his 90th birthday at the center that year. He was a mainstay at Horse Meadow Senior Center and continued to participate in its wide range of services and programs for the next six years.

The combination of a dedicated volunteer force and local funding makes it possible for us to provide the volume and quality of services upon which so many rely. We convey heartfelt thanks from the Board of Directors and GCSCC staff for your vital support.
